Dear new member of St John's,

Congratulations on gaining your place at St John's. I look forward very much to meeting you, and in this brief note, I'd like to introduce the work of the chapel.

St John's has a chapel, and a chaplain to organise services, as our founder Sir Thomas White wished when he set up the college in the middle of the sixteenth century. Of course, this doesn't mean that in 2023 St John's favours Christianity over any other faith: our college draws together people of all faiths and none, on a basis of mutual respect. It is my privilege to work with all who seek me out, irrespective of their belief system.

The chapel welcomes all people without seeking to 'convert' anyone, and I am proud that we were the first place in St John's to display the LGBTQ+ flag. We're not 'just' affirming: it's who we are. There are regular services during term-time, and people come to chapel for a variety of reasons, many of which are nothing to do with religious belief: many simply enjoy the music sung by our excellent choir, the time to reflect and the calm, quiet space. The chapel, like the rest of the College, is a place for questioning and thought, and those who are invited to speak reflect their understandings of what it is to be a human being in the twenty-first century.

Music is a key part of our services, and the Choir Director, David Bannister, (choir.director@sjc.ox.ac.uk) would be delighted to hear from anyone who might like to audition for the choir. Neither Christian belief nor experience of singing in a choir is necessary, and many highly successful choristers have never sung in chapel before coming to St John's. We award choral scholarships in Hilary term each year for those who demonstrate commitment and excellence. All members of the choir receive one-to-one singing lessons from our singing teacher, and payment for special services, such as Gaudy evensongs and alumni carols services.

Throughout your time at St John's, you can come to talk to me in confidence about any matter, and I'm always happy to go for a walk, or provide a hot beverage. You can find me in Front 1.1, or drop me an email.
