

We continue to champion upcoming talent, over a third of our line-up comes from first time or student filmmakers. We also have a few established names lurking in the festival – see if you can spot them!




Rat Poison


The Real Cian Stanley


Strokes of Wildflowers


A Part Of Oneself


Bitter Fruit


Prom Party Massacre


Another Day

About The Festival

Oxford Shorts celebrates the diversity and creativity of short films. We believe short films are an art form in themselves, ideally one which should be experienced together. We look for great stories with strong characters, unique voices, or evocative worlds that are designed to stir emotions.

Our inaugural festival ran on Saturday 23rd March 2019 at St John's College, Oxford. Tickets to the event sold out extremely quickly. The day attracted over 200 audience members across

three onsite venues, with over 90 films being played. Our line-up included the 2019 BAFTA-award winning animation *Roughhouse* and a special interview with Academy Award-winning visual effects supervisor Paul J. Franklin (Oscar wins for *Inception* and *Interstellar*).

The pandemic forced the festival online for 2020. We played 135 entries over eleven weeks from 8 May to 23 July. Each week, we held live Q&A chats with filmmakers, and ran a number

of talks and masterclasses with our friends and sponsors. In 2023, we rebranded from 'Oxford International Short Film Festival' to 'Oxford Shorts'. 2025 introduced features to our Programme.

We are delighted to say 'Feature Corner' has returned again this year. 2026 marks our seventh edition. This time we will play 129 short films with live screenings and online blocks.

'Dogspiracy' follows British vet, author and animal welfare campaigner Marc Abraham as he investigates the US puppy mill pipeline, canine fertility clinics and puppy smuggling. In America and the UK he meets decision-makers who have the power to change the law. But he eventually uncovers a conspiracy that prevents bipartisan laws from being passed. This leads to frustration and many more years of legalized abuse. 'Dogspiracy' aims to empower the public into knowing how to do the right thing, despite the disappointment from our politicians.

Dr Marc Abraham OBE, or 'Marc the Vet' as he's usually known, is a multi-award-winning veterinary surgeon, author, broadcaster, and animal welfare campaigner.

Marc is the founder of puppy farm awareness campaign 'Pup Aid', and led the successful 'Lucy's Law' campaign in Westminster to ban commercial 3rd party puppy and kitten sellers, e.g. pet shops, making all UK dog and cat breeders accountable.

Based in Brighton, Marc is also the co-founder and secretariat of the All-Party Parliamentary Dog Advisory Welfare Group (APDAWG), appears regularly in the media, and visits local schools to chat with pupils about caring for animals and looking out for each other.

Marc was recently awarded the OBE for services to animal welfare by His Royal Highness King Charles III.


MAP OF ST JOHN'S COLLEGE


